

- NIE (Foreigner Identification Number): Essential for most legal and financial transactions.
- Empadronamiento (Padrón): Register at your local town hall for access to public services.
- Healthcare Registration: Public or private, depending on your visa type.
- Bank Account: Necessary for rent, utilities, and many subscriptions.
- Driving Licence: EU licences are valid; non-EU may need conversion.
- School Enrolment: Research options (state, semi-private, international) and apply early.


